Our Goals

- Provide educational assistance (academic assessment and tutoring) to youth to strengthen their English language, literacy, numeracy and other academic skills.
- Facilitate access to higher education through the provision of scholarships.
- Promote positive social connections by providing a safe place for youth to learn together and assist them in transitioning to Canadian society.
- Assisting the families of youth in developing a sense of belonging in Canadian society by providing English language instruction to parents and hosting community events (such as Village Kitchens).
- Facilitate positive mental health among youth by providing opportunities for them to explore their talents (through passion projects).
- Facilitate community movement toward universal safety via embracing cultural diversity by educating the community about The Peaceful Village program and its value to the community.

The Peaceful Village Program is centred on a human rights and social justice framework, where we believe that:

- the aims of public-school education are to build more peaceful, democratic, healthy and joyful communities.
- youth, particularly newcomer youth and their families face many barriers when they enter the public school system in Canada.
- participants (students, families, educators, program staff, and other community organizations) must work together to help public schools actualize the aims of public education in Manitoba.



We aspire to improve educational outcomes, expand possibilities, and support our youth in the Peaceful Village along with their individual paths to achieve their full potential and success. Our focus is to reduce the negative impact of external factors that affect the educational success of our youth in our community.

HIGHLIGHTS

2023/2024 Graduates and Scholarship Recipients Overview

In June 2024, 288 Peaceful Village participants earned scholarships to support their post-secondary education and training, which can be claimed upon their high school graduation.

The 2023/2024 academic year was a successful one for the Peaceful Village Program, with 79 youth participants graduating from high school. The breakdown of graduates from each site is shown below:

YMCA YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAM




This year, we hosted and participated in two exchange programs during April, May, and June. Our twin partners were Personalized Learning Centre and Abraar Secondary School. Our youth and staff took part in a week-long exchange, hosted in Winnipeg and visiting Ottawa, Ontario, through the YMCA Exchange Program.

Our Learning Centre

Learning Centers continue to create an instant friendship network for our students. Our learning centers are all open to in-person programs. Our learning centers offer academic and social support (including tutoring, language, nutritious snacks/meals, and bus tickets). All our learning centers are staffed with culturally diverse staff and volunteer staff.

COMMUNITY CELEBRATION & RECOGNITION OF LEARNING



Our annual Community Celebration and Recognition of Learning event is a time to honor the hard work and achievements of our youth. It brings together students, families, and community members to celebrate their accomplishments. During the event, we award scholarships and bid farewell to our graduating students. Last year, the event was a great success, with over 400 people in attendance.



This community kitchen allows us to prepare hot meals for more than 800 youth across our seven Peaceful Village sites.

This kitchen also offers students a space to carry out passion projects like baking which is a great way to foster creativity, skill development, and a sense of community.

Food Drive

The Peaceful Village continues to run its annual food drive to ensure that underserved youth and families have enough to eat during the holiday season.

Each year, we receive donations of non-perishable food from the community, which we then package into food hampers and deliver to our youth and families before the holidays begin.

Our December 2023 food drive was a great success, allowing us to pack over 500 food hampers. We are incredibly grateful to all our generous donors and supporters for making this possible.

Summer Program

The Summer Program at Peaceful Village provides unique opportunities for youth to build confidence and develop new skills. This year, all seven sites came together for combined activities, allowing the villagers to connect and embrace the spirit of being "One Village," despite our different locations. Over 150 youth registered and took part in the program, with many having the chance to go on field trips and engage with the community. The program culminated in a two-night camping experience at Spruce Woods Provincial Park, where 40 youth participated.
