Message from The Peaceful Village Program-MB Inc. Board Chair

Annual General Meeting December 8, 2025

I would like to extend a heartfelt welcome to everyone as we wrap up another successful year at The Peaceful Village.

Where did 2025 go?

So many fun and very fortunate things happened!

We changed our name. This has been in the works for something like 5 years.

The Schroeder Foundation generously filled the gap left by IRCC, and that allowed us to continue as planned without any drastic budget changes.

We opened a site at Shaughnessy Park, had a successful spring, and saw an enrollment of 42 students in September.

Daniel received the King Charles III Coronation Medal, and I think we need to start calling him Sir Daniel.

In June we had a wonderful cultural exchange with Granisle, BC, and then a huge turnout with over 1000 people attending the celebration of learning.

How much celebration?

We celebrated 71 high school graduates, with a 93% graduation rate, and secured \$118,050.00 of scholarships.

That's a lot of celebration!

We opened another site at Nelson McIntyre Collegiate in September

We won the Manitoba Mosaic Award 2025—Welcoming Community Champion Award

All these success stories were made possible because of the generosity of our funders, the dedication of our staff and volunteers, the trust of the parents and the members of the board, and the enthusiasm of all our students.

Our work is to encourage schools and communities to act out for renewal in diverse ways that suit their contexts. We recognize that working for social justice in education requires both courage and vulnerability to re imagine, reconsider, and recreate powerful learning opportunities and relationships with students.

The Peaceful Village Program-MB Inc. is a not-for-profit, non-government, independent organization that is dedicated to the advancement of education to marginalized youth, particularly immigrants and refugees in Manitoba and to assisting such youth in achieving their potential.





Youth-led:

Aspire and design for establishing youth ownership by engaging and responding to the voices of youth and families.

Collaborative:

Individuals, funders, organizations, schools, and advocacy groups collaborate and meet to ensure the success of youth education.

Flexibility:

Flexibility in our program to suit the voices and needs of youth and families.

Community-Based:

Our focus, mandate and staffing are Community-Based, community-focused, and community-empowered

Our Goals

- Provide educational assistance (academic assessment and tutoring) to youth to strengthen their English language, literacy, numeracy and other academic skills.
- Facilitate access to higher education through the provision of scholarships.
- Promote positive social connections by providing a safe place for youth to learn together and assist them in transitioning to Canadian society.
- Assisting the families of youth in developing a sense of belonging in Canadian society by providing English language instruction to parents and hosting community events (such as Village Kitchens).
- Facilitate positive mental health among youth by providing opportunities for them to explore their talents (through passion projects).
- Facilitate community movement toward universal safety via embracing cultural diversity by educating the community about The Peaceful Village program and its value to the community.

The Peaceful Village Program is centred on a human rights and social justice framework, where we believe that:

- the aims of public-school education are to build more peaceful, democratic, healthy and joyful communities.
- youth, particularly newcomer youth and their families face many barriers when they enter the public school system in Canada.
- participants (students, families, educators, program staff, and other community organizations) must work together to help public schools actualize the aims of public education in Manitoba.



We aspire to improve educational outcomes, expand possibilities, and support our youth in the Peaceful Village along with their individual paths to achieve their full potential and success. Our focus is to reduce the negative impact of external factors that affect the educational success of our youth in our community.

Executive Director Report

Key Achievements and Impacts

- Students Served: Over 829 pupils participated in Peaceful Village programs across all sites.
- Academic Support: Delivered 4000+ hours of tutoring and homework assistance.
- Scholarships: \$118,050.00 earned in scholarships towards post-secondary education or training
- Graduation Success: 71 of the Grade 12 students in our program graduated with a 93% graduation rate, and many are pursuing postsecondary education or training.
- Family Engagement: Hosted 40+ family engagement events, strengthening community ties.
- Our kitchen continues to provide 500-600 hot meals to our students.
- Volunteer Contributions: Over 800 volunteer hours dedicated to supporting students and families.
- Holistic Summer Program: Over 200 youth participated and benefited from our summer program between the months of July and August.
- New Initiatives: Launched one new Peaceful Village site at Shaughnessy Park School in Winnipeg School Division, expanding our reach to underserved communities.

HIGHLIGHTS

2024/2025 Graduates and Scholarship Recipients Overview

In June 2025, 296 Peaceful Village participants earned scholarships to support their post-secondary education and training, which can be claimed upon their high school graduation.

The 2024/2025 academic year was a successful one for the Peaceful Village Program, with 71 youth participants graduating from high school. The breakdown of graduates from each site is shown below:

HIGHLIGHTS

This year, we are proud to highlight the impactful opening of our new Learning Centre at Shaughnessy Park School, located in North End of the city. Designed to serve our participants between grade 5 to 8, the Learning Centre provides a warm, safe, and engaging space beyond the school day.

Here, students receive dedicated support to complete their homework and can socialize and build new friendships in a supportive environment. The program is further enriched by access to the school's gym for fun physical activities, promoting healthy habits and teamwork.

Understanding that active minds and bodies need fuel, we ensure every child is supported with a nutritious snack and a hot meal on each programming day. This holistic approach is fostering greater confidence, academic progress, and joy for the children in our community





This year, we hosted and participated in exchange programs during May. Our twin partners were Babine Elementary Secondary School. Our youth and staff took part in a week-long exchange, hosted in Winnipeg in May and visiting Babine Elementary Secondary School, Granisle, British Columbia in June, through the YMCA Exchange Program.



Our annual Community Celebration and Recognition of Learning event is a time to honor the hard work and achievements of our youth. It brings together students, families, and community members to celebrate their accomplishments. During the event, we award scholarships and bid farewell to our graduating students. Last year, the event was a great success, with over 400 people in attendance.

Food Drive

The Peaceful Village continues to run its annual food drive to ensure that underserved youth and families have enough to eat during the holiday season.

Each year, we receive donations of non-perishable food from the community, which we then package into food hampers and deliver to our youth and families before the holidays begin.

Our December 2024 food drive was a great success, allowing us to pack over 400 food hampers. We are incredibly grateful to all our generous donors and supporters for making this possible.

Summer Program

The Summer Program at Peaceful Village provides unique opportunities for youth to build confidence and develop new skills. This year, all nine sites came together for combined activities, allowing the villagers to connect and embrace the spirit of being "One Village," despite our different locations. Over 150 youth registered and took part in the program, with many having the chance to go on field trips and engage with the community. The program culminated in a two-night camping experience at Spruce Woods Provincial Park, where 40 youth participated.



Summer Program St John's High School

The summer program at St. John's High School, generously sponsored by the Schroeder Foundation, ran successfully from July 7th to August 15th, operating five days a week. The program saw strong engagement, with average daily attendance growing from 30 students in July to 45 in August. The weekly schedule was structured to provide a balanced experience, featuring enriching indoor activities at the school on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, while educational field trips were conducted on Tuesdays and Fridays. Throughout the program, Terra Bay Food Services reliably prepared and provided all meals for the participating students.

Our Learning Centre

Learning Centers continue to create an instant friendship network for our students. Our learning centers are all open to in-person programs. Our learning centers offer academic and social support (including tutoring, language, nutritious snacks/meals, and bus tickets). All our learning centers are staffed with culturally diverse staff and volunteer staff.

In addition, the Community Site is open to students and parents from 9:00 am – 12:00 noon on Saturdays, during school breaks and summertime.





This community kitchen allows us to prepare hot meals for more than 800 youth across our eight Peaceful Village sites.

This kitchen also offers students a space to carry out passion projects like baking which is a great way to foster creativity, skill development, and a sense of community.
